Leo brings such strengths and passions to the position, I can't wait for him to be in office and serve with him. I am also very confident and proud of the other officers, board members, and active members-at-large that oversee the CVBC, and know full well that our club is in good hands. The future of the CVBC looks very bright indeed.
